Re: Amendment to FN 2015-276.1 to include FAA Task Orders assigned as part of the FAA Master Agreement between Oneida County and the FAA.

Dear Mr. Picente:

The Federal Aviation Administration, as required by the FAA Modernization and Reform ACT (FMRA) of 2012 has initiated a program to Support Safe Integration of UAS into the NAS. The FMRA also called for the establishment of six (6) FAA designated UAS Test Ranges. These Test Ranges were established for the purpose of research, development, and testing of unmanned aircraft systems to support integration of UAS into the National Airspace System (NAS). In conjunction with this program, the FAA has established Master Agreements with each of the Test Sites. The Master Agreements put in place a contracting vehicle to award individual Task Orders providing a wide range of services to support The FAA's efforts to fully support the UAS into the NAS efforts. The Task Orders will support selected FAA projects assigned to the Test Site, while also supporting the FAA program of safe integration of UAS in the NAS.

Each Task Order from the FAA will constitute a separate contract opportunity with differing time frames for completion. The FAA has alerted the Test Site operators that the response time allotted for response to their request for proposals on each Task Order may be as short as 24-72 hours. Further, as a condition to the submission of these proposals, they will need to be fully authorized by the County, as the Other Transaction Agreement holder with the FAA, and binding on the County as submitted, when submitted. This, of course, would constitute a deviation from the normal course of contract practice and procedure as set forth in the Oneida County Charter and Code. Accordingly, I am requesting that you submit a request to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for an exception from the Charter and the Code.

In practice, this request will grant permission to you, as County Executive, to sign the proposals, as well as, any contracts between the County and our contractors necessary to complete the work for each separate Task Order. Additionally, you would be authorized to pay out any funds received pursuant to the proposals to those entities which submitted work, materials, services or other consideration in the process of preparing our submissions relative to the Task Orders.

Dear Board Members:

Oneida County has been notified by the FAA that it is the recipient of a grant / task order to conduct research in Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) on behalf of the FAA. The grant / task order is one of many expected to be awarded by the FAA. The FAA has guaranteed a minimum of \$150,000 in funding for conducting research on its behalf. However, the total amount of research dollars awarded could be as much as \$4.8 million dollars over the next five years.

Oneida County will also be entering into contracts to complete the many task orders that may be assigned by the FAA. Task Order/Award announcement is expected to occur over the next several weeks or months. Once the final award is announced this legislation will have to be amended to reflect any changes.

This legislation will establish an account for the minimum guaranteed grant from FAA to allow Oneida County to start work immediately once the award is finally announced.





In the 2015 Capital Projects meetings, Commissioner Davis requested \$5,100,000 for the Capital Project of renovating 300 W. Dominic Street and 301 W. Dominic Street to accommodate one additional Family Court Judge in the Rome Family Court Offices. As the Commissioner has explained in other legislation this project was going to be done in two phases. This resulted in a reduction of the original project to \$500,000 to cover the design and professional consulting services.

The second phase, the renovation and construction phase, will include the relocation of the Probation Department with cost estimated at \$670,000. This will require an additional \$520,000 in funding to complete the move phase.

I therefore request your Board's approval for an amendment to **Capital Project H-523** — **Rome Family Court:**

Dear County Executive Picente,

In the 2014 the Department of Public Works requested a \$5,100,000.00 Capital Project for renovation of 300 W. Dominick St and 301 W. Dominic St. to accommodate one additional Family Court Judge in the Rome Family Court Offices. Following a thorough review it was decided to fund the project in two phases. Phase 1 would fund design and professional consulting services and Phase 2 would fund renovation and construction. Therefore, Capital Project H-523, Rome Family Court, was created with an initial budget of \$500,000.00.

Renovation and construction includes relocation of Adult Probation and Juvenile Probation (collectively referred to as the Probation Department) from 300 W. Dominic St. to 301 W. Dominic St. This work must be complete before renovation of 301 W. Dominic St. can begin. Therefore, I propose separating renovation and construction into two phases. Phase 2A would include all work necessary to relocate the Probation Department and Phase 2B would include all work necessary to expand Rome Family Court Offices.

Construction documents for Phase 2A are substantially complete and the Architect has submitted a final construction cost estimate of approximately \$670,000.00. There will be an unencumbered balance of approximately \$150,000.00 from original \$500,000.00 budget. Therefore, an additional \$520,000.00 will be required to fund Phase 2A.

As noted in previous communications, timing for this project is critical. I recommend an immediate amendment to H-523, increasing the total budget to \$1,020,000.00. Funding for Phase 2B would then be requested as part of the 2016 Capital Project Budget. If you concur, please forward this request to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for consideration.







On July 21, 2015 at approximately 5:30pm a run-away rail car caused significant structural damage to the south tower of a pedestrian bridge located at Union Station, 321 Main Street, Utica, NY. The south tower is immediately adjacent to CSX "Track 2" and the pedestrian bridge crosses CSX "Track 1" and CSX "Track 2". A portion of the south tower is structurally unstable and may collapse. In addition, the structural stability of the pedestrian bridge must be investigated.

Existing conditions create an immediate health and safety hazard to the property and residents of Oneida County. Therefore, in accordance with Section 103(4) of the NYS General Municipal Law, a Certificate of Necessity has been executed thereby allowing structural repairs to begin immediately.

I respectfully request creation of a Capital Project to provide necessary funding for structural repair of the pedestrian bridge located at Union Station. The total cost estimate is currently \$700,000.00. It is assumed all of this cost will be reimbursed by Oneida County's insurance carrier or other responsible parties. Cost estimates and funding splits will change as work progresses and additional details become available.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made this day of 2015, by and between the COUNTY OF ONEIDA, a municipal corporation organized and existing pursuant to the laws of the State of New York, with its principal office located at 800 Park Avenue, Utica, New York, hereinafter called "County" and the HOLLAND PATENT CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT, a municipal corporation organized and existing pursuant to the laws of the State of New York, with its offices located at 9601 Main Street, Holland Patent, New York, hereinafter called the "District".

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the County has created "Partners in Prosperity Funding" as a long term investment in stabilizing property taxes as well as investing in education, infrastructure, public safety, the economy and the arts from gaming revenue as agreed on in the historic Settlement Agreement with the Oneida Indian Nation; and

WHEREAS, the Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Fund Grant Program is funded through the Partners in Prosperity Program to make our schools the leading institutions in the state in preparation for our new technology-based economy; and

WHEREAS, the District has instituted a "Full STEAM Ahead" project to expand established efforts in STEM education through staff development, expanding STEM learning opportunities during the school day, and extending STEM learning after school with community partners; and

WHEREAS, the District requires the purchase of professional services, supplies and equipment to expand the "Full STEAM Ahead" efforts to prepare the students to take advantage of educational and employment opportunities in technologically based disciplines and fields; and

WHEREAS, the District did approach the County by way of submitting a proposal for Partners in Prosperity funding and the County deems it desirable to appropriate a sum of money to support the costs related to the proposed activities.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to Oneida County Board of Legislators resolution number 315 of 2014 and Resolution No. of 2015, the parties hereto, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, do hereby agree as follows:

- 1. The District agrees that it shall further STEM education in our schools, as more fully described in the proposal, attached as Exhibit A.
- 2. The County agrees to pay to the District the sum of FORTY EIGHT THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED TWENTY SIX DOLLARS and 00/100 (\$48,326.00) to purchase services, supplies and equipment through the District's "Full STEAM Ahead" project. Such payment shall be made by County after receipt of a voucher, accompanied by the appropriate documentation presented by the District on forms prescribed by the County and after audit and approval by the Oneida County

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Comptroller.

- 3. The District agrees to submit documentation evidencing the activities completed, including but not limited to invoices and cancelled checks, and to submit a report to the Oneida County Department of Planning, 321 Main Street, Utica, New York 13501, C/O Regina Venettozzi, including a narrative that describes project work completed and benefits realized and a self-evaluation of the achieved project goals and encountered impediments no later than January 31, 2016. Representatives of the County shall have the right to examine the books and records of the District at any reasonable time during any business day on reasonable notice given to the Holland Patent Central School District Superintendent of Schools.
- 4. Officers, agents, directors and employees of the District in accordance with the status of the District as an independent contractor, covenant and agree that they will conduct themselves consistent with such status; that they will neither hold themselves out as, nor claim to be, officers or employees of Oneida County by reason thereof, and they will not by reason thereof, make any claim, demand or application to, or for, any right or privilege applicable to an officer or employee of Oneida County, including, but not limited to, Workmen's Compensation coverage, unemployment insurance benefits, Social Security coverage or retirement membership or credit.
- 5. The District may not assign, transfer, convey, sublet or otherwise dispose of the Agreement or of its' right, title or interest therein, or the power to execute this Agreement, to any other person, corporation or other entity without the previous consent, in writing, by the County.
- 6. The County and the District agree that this agreement is in accordance with Resolution No. 315 of 2014 and Resolution No. of 2015, as approved by the Oneida County Board of Legislators.
- 7. The District agrees that it shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County and its officers, agents and employees from any claims, demands, causes of action and judgments arising out of injuries to person or property of whatever kind or nature as a result of furnishing the services provided for in this agreement.
- 8. The terms of this Agreement, including any attachments, amendments, addendums or appendices attached hereto, constitute the entire understanding and agreement of the parties and cancels and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, understandings or agreements, whether written or oral, with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.
